Exploring the intersection of cryptocurrency and organized crime, this presentation delves into how digital currencies facilitate fraud and illicit activities, highlighting emerging trends and preventive measures. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) plays a crucial role in combating crypto-enabled fraud and organized crime by training officers to investigate cryptocurrency-related crimes, tracing digital currency transactions, and collaborating with other agencies to counter illicit activities.

Examining the interprovincial investigation into the fraud and trafficking of identifying information, this presentation focuses on the landmark case of R. c. Westerlin Jean-Pierre. The case of R. c. Westerlin Jean-Pierre involves an interprovincial investigation into fraud and trafficking of identifying information. Westerlin Jean-Pierre, a 24-year-old from Terrebonne, Québec, pleaded guilty of fraud after taking control of victims' cell phones remotely to steal personal information and funds. He defrauded 154 individuals, amassing approximately \$700 000 which he used to fund a lavish lifestyle. Jean-Pierre was sentenced to four years in prison and a fine of \$250 000 for his crimes.
